Shelter Advocacy following a shelter stay results in lower levels of abuse for 18 months – no difference after 18 months (C. Sullivan, 05).

**Protection Orders Equal lower reports** of abuse for women who received a protection order compared to women who did not receive at 18 months(McFarlane,
